# **SPOTLIGHT ON: Time Change Reduces Visibility**

Be Safe. Be Seen. Tips for Drivers and Pedestrians

On October 21, 22 and 23, 2013 a team including ICBC, the RCMP, the Maple Ridge Fire Department, volunteers from the RCMP Auxiliary, Citizens On Patrol, the Fire Youth Academy and RCMP Youth Program spread out throughout the town centre distributing reflectors and an information sheet with tips for pedestrians and drivers on how to be safe and be seen this fall and winter.

On Sunday morning the clocks go back one hour, and that means that there will be less daylight in the evenings, and that means that we all have to do our part to stay safe. Here are the tips we gave those folks during our blitz;

#### Tips for pedestrians

- Always make eye contact with drivers when crossing the street. Never assume that a driver has seen you.
- Focus your full attention on what's happening around you. Remove your headphones and never talk, text or use electronic devices in an intersection or while crossing.
- $\cdot$  Wear reflective clothing or use reflective gear to make it easier for drivers to see you. This is especially important in wet weather and dark conditions when drivers may not be able to see you.

#### Tips for drivers

 $\cdot$  Always be on the lookout for pedestrians - especially in dark, wet weather when visibility is limited, at

intersections and near transit stops where pedestrians will be coming and going and may not use crosswalks.

- When turning at an intersection, scan the crosswalk to make sure there are no pedestrians crossing.
- If a vehicle is stopped in front of you or in the lane next to you, they may be yielding for a pedestrian, so be prepared to stop.

It's simple; the best fashion for winter is bright reflective clothing. Reflectors, arm bands, safety vests and anything that stands out in the dark is what you should be wearing when you are walking, jogging or on your bike. Please be safe and be seen this winter!

## **Gathering to Honour the Heroes Past, Present and Future.**



Memorial Peace Park's name derives from its role as the home for the numerous memorials to the men and women who have served our nation's armed forces both in war and in peace. The centrepiece of the park is the Cenotaph that was originally located near the Maple Ridge Cemetery. As part of the coronation celebration for Queen Elizabeth II, the Cenotaph was moved downtown almost 60 years ago. It was moved one more time to its current location in Memorial Peace Park as part of the major town centre redesign that occurred over a decade ago.

Today, volunteers from the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 88 oversee the annual Remembrance Day event that begins with a march from the Legion at 224 Street and Brown Avenue south to Haney Place. In 2011, this section of road was dedicated as 'Veterans Way', and signage denotes this special relationship. The Peace Tree marks the southern boundary of Veterans Way. This event is attended by thousands of local residents and their children. The march will include veterans of Canada's Army, Navy and Air Force, as well as members of the Ridge Meadows RCMP, Maple Ridge Fire Department, Corrections Service, plus Cadets, Scouts, Cubs and organizations, such as St. Johns Ambulance.

There will be **Road Closures** during this event from 10:00 am to Noon as 224 Street will be closed from Brown Avenue to 119 Avenue, which includes the intersection at 224 Street and Dewdney Trunk Road. Please use other routes on Sunday, November 11.

The fly past and moment of silence will take place at 11:00 am. The march happens just after 10:00 am and the ceremony ends between 11:30 and Noon with the march out from the park. There will be vintage vehicles as part of the 'Parade of Heroes'. Bring your family down to pay tribute to the men and women who have served our nation in war, those who have served as peacekeepers, and those who serve today around the world.
