Commercial/Institutional category

First opening on River Road in 1926, the Fuller Watson Store moved up the hill to its present location in 1931. Run for many years by Owen Fuller and Ro Veinotte, the store is still locally owned.

Youth Achievement Award





Helmi Braches is a writer, editor, and translator with a Master's degree in linguistics. She loves cooking Indonesian food, travelling in South America, and learning everything about animals. She thinks understanding the history of a place is important for planning for its future.

Sarah Hossack has been a resident of Maple Ridge for 29 years and is a great-great-granddaughter of John and Ida Lucy Jackson, from Jackson Farm in Albion. Sarah graduated from the Bachelor of Arts program at the University College of the Fraser Valley with a major in history and a minor in sociology in 2006. She also acted as the Volunteer Coordinator at Haney House from 1998 to 2001, training and scheduling volunteers.

John McCormick has had a varied career starting out apprenticing and working in the restoration field as a carpenter in the historic districts of Ottawa. In the 1990s John completed his Bachelor of Architecture at the University of British Columbia and interned with Western Canada's only First Nations Architecture Firm.

Working on several first nations cultural centres in BC was good training for his move to Parks Canada in 1998. Since that time John has worked as a historic sites planner with many Aboriginal groups and heritage organizations in Western and Northern Canada.

John is currently a certification agent with the Historic Places Initiative as well as being BC's and Northern Canada's coordinator for the Federal Heritage Building Review Office. John and his family of four have been very happy to call Maple Ridge home since 1998.

Councillor **Craig Speirs** is the liaison with the municipal council and is committed to making our community a better place by growing in ways that respect and sustain our social, natural, and economic environments.

Craig, an environmental and social activist, has been a resident of Maple Ridge since 1973 and has been married for over 20 years to Diane. He has two children, Adlayna and Rory, and is currently retired after 34 years with the Liquor Distribution Branch.

He is the past director of the Ridge-Meadows Recycling Society and the Fraser Information Society, and the past chair of the Maple Ridge-Pitt Meadows Fundraising Committee for BC's Children's Hospital. For his work on these charities Craig has received several awards.

In his spare time, Craig enjoys photography, organic gardening, hiking our fantastic local trails, and is a wine columnist and educator.
